2024 A YEAR OF REFLECTION AND TRANSFORMATION

In 2024, KAIROS continued its journey of deep reflection and intentional rebuilding. Amid transitions across the organization and the world, we stayed rooted in our mission while boldly transforming the ways we show up for justice. We strengthened grassroots migrant justice work, supported a new

generation of climate advocates through just transition dialogues, laid the foundation for renewed growth in the KAIROS Blanket Exercise and affirmed the vital role of women peacebuilders in the Global South, while setting the stage for the next phase of Women of Courage. Through partnerships with Indigenous

communities, global peacebuilders and frontline defenders, we confronted urgent crises with courage and care. This year, KAIROS reimagined its role in movement building. The stories in this report reflect a movement that responds to change, and shapes it too—with hope, discipline and vision.

Migrant Justice

DEEPENING OUR MIGRANT JUSTICE WORK

In 2024, KAIROS rebuilt and deepened its Migrant Justice work by investing in grassroots partnerships, expanding national advocacy, and helping shape new platforms for collective action. We strengthened our commitment to migrant-led movements and ecumenical collaborations that uphold the dignity and rights of people experiencing forced migration, precarious status, and systemic barriers. Our work spanned national policy spaces, international solidarity networks and local community gatherings—each reinforcing our long-standing call for justice and regularization for all migrants.

NATIONAL ADVOCACY AND POLICY LEADERSHIP

We joined the [Migrant Rights Network](#), churches, and civil society allies to oppose anti-immigration rhetoric and call for permanent residency for all. Leah Shifferaw, KAIROS' Migrant Justice Team Lead, played a key role in national advocacy through the Canadian Council for Refugees, shaping policies on housing, employment, settlement and migrant protections.

FAITH-BASED SOLIDARITY

Following the international consultation in Indonesia, KAIROS helped launch the **Canadian Chapter of Churches Witnessing with Migrants**, a global ecumenical platform for migrant rights rooted in faith-based action.

GRASSROOTS MOBILIZING

We supported the Toronto launch of the [International Migrant Alliance](#) and partnered with the Caribbean Workers Outreach Program to co-host a vibrant community event for agricultural workers in Leamington, Ontario—celebrating culture, connection and belonging.

MOVEMENT BUILDING

KAIROS participated in the Canadian Council for Refugees' national consultation in Ottawa and stood in solidarity at the **Day Without Migrants** rally in Toronto, amplifying migrant voices and calls for regularization, labour rights and justice.

Ecological Justice

STRENGTHENING VOICES FOR A JUST TRANSITION

In 2024, with support from the Catherine Donnelly Foundation, KAIROS launched the **Strengthening Voices for a Just Transition** project—an initiative to amplify grassroots leadership and build momentum for climate justice, rooted in equity and care. The project brought together diverse communities to explore pathways toward a just transition that centers social transformation, Indigenous leadership and frontline perspectives.

Community dialogues took place in Saskatoon, Edmonton and Cape Breton. Working closely with local organizers, KAIROS created inclusive

visionary spaces where participants could share lived experiences, deepen understanding and imagine a better future.

The project nurtured a cohort of young adult leaders from these regions. Participants engaged with Indigenous, Global South and climate justice experts. They developed advocacy skills and gained the confidence to speak directly with elected officials about their vision for a just, inclusive transition.



For the Love of Creation

KAIROS continued to play a leadership role in [For the Love of Creation](#) (FLC), a national faith-based climate justice initiative. In May 2024, KAIROS joined other members to reimagine FLC's contribution to the climate movement and strengthen collaboration across the network. The gathering focused on

building deeper relationships, fostering trust and advancing commitments to anti-oppression, anti-racism and decolonization.

During **Earth Week 2024 – Together for the Love of Creation**, over 100 faith communities across Canada engaged in prayer, learning and climate action. In November, the **Candles for COP** campaign invited communities to light candles as a sign of hope for strong climate commitments at COP29 in Baku, Azerbaijan.

Give it Up for the Earth: a joint campaign with Citizens for Public Justice, mobilized supporters to sign an open letter to Minister Guilbeault, collecting over 300 signatures calling for stronger climate action. In August, FLC representatives, including KAIROS' Cheryl McNamara, met with the Minister to press for urgent climate action.

COMING TOGETHER FOR CLIMATE JUSTICE ON LOSS AND DAMAGE

During COP29, we launched the video, [Coming Together for Climate Justice on Loss and Damage](#). The screening and discussion galvanized deeper understanding and action on loss and damage funding. Created in collaboration with ecumenical partners, the video was accompanied by a letter to the Prime Minister and key cabinet ministers, urging Canada to significantly increase its support for loss and damage funding.

PASSED! CANADA ENACTS JUST TRANSITION AND ENVIRONMENTAL RACISM LAWS

In 2024, Canada passed two landmark environmental laws. In June, Bill C-50—[the Canadian Sustainable Jobs Act](#)—became law, committing to the creation of sustainable jobs and accelerating the shift to a net-zero economy. That same month, Bill C-226—[the National Strategy Respecting Environmental Racism](#)

[and Environmental Justice Act](#)—received Royal Assent. KAIROS played a key role in advancing Bill C-226 through strong advocacy and active leadership within the Canadian Coalition for Environmental and Climate Justice (CCECJ). In September, KAIROS helped shape the Act's implementation by participating in Canada's first Environmental Justice and Racism Symposium. We will continue to press for accountability as the Act's national strategy takes shape.

Indigenous Rights

KAIROS INDIGENOUS RIGHTS CIRCLE

KAIROS' Indigenous Rights Circle (KIRC) traveled to Sipekne'katik First Nation—part of the historic Mi'kma'ki territory—where they met members of the Mi'kmaq Grand Council. Council members shared powerful stories of grassroots resistance and environmental protection, underscoring the urgency of building respectful, reciprocal relationships with Indigenous communities. The visit ended with a solemn stop at the former Shubenacadie Indian Residential School site, where Circle Members offered prayers and tobacco in honour of the children who suffered there. These profound encounters rooted the Circle's work in lived realities of resistance, resilience and the ongoing path toward truth and right relations.

SOLIDARITY IN ACTION

Throughout the year, KAIROS marked key moments of Indigenous resistance and remembrance:

- National Day of Awareness for MMIWG2S+
- National Indigenous History Month
- Orange Shirt Day
- National Day of Action for MMIWG2S+

We amplified Indigenous voices, shared critical community news, and deepened our commitment to truth, justice and reconciliation.

HONOURING THE NATIONAL DAY FOR TRUTH AND RECONCILIATION

For the National Day for Truth and Reconciliation, KAIROS staff member, artist and Algonquins of Pikwàkanagàn

First Nation member Connor Sarazin shared a moving reflection titled [Orange Stands for Resilience](#). His artwork, *Lost Children*, honoured the lives lost to residential schools and reminded us of the strength of survivors and their communities.

KAIROS BLANKET EXERCISE (KBE)

In 2024, KAIROS laid the groundwork for the next chapter of the KAIROS Blanket Exercise (KBE)—a powerful tool for truth-telling and transformative learning. The KBE team welcomed two new staff: Susan Bujold, Partnerships Coordinator, and Taylor Bate, Education and Training Coordinator. Together, they advanced a new database system, launched a national information session series reaching over 100 participants and



began developing a new training curriculum to support partner-led facilitation across the country.

Though in transition, KAIROS delivered KBEs to key partners and allies, including Audacious Hope, the United and Presbyterian Churches’ Youth and Young Adult Gathering.

SHARED JOURNEY WITH THE ALASKA NATIVE TRIBAL HEALTH CONSORTIUM

In April, KAIROS’ Global and Newcomer Coordinator Alfredo Barahona traveled to Juneau to visit the Alaska Native Tribal Health Consortium (ANTHC), a long-time KBE partner. He witnessed local leadership’s commitment to the new Indigenous-led KBE model. Alfredo shared KAIROS’ gratitude for ANTHC’s partnership in developing the Alaska Blanket Exercise to walk the path of truth and reconciliation through the power of story. The KBE team is grateful for donor and community partner support that enables solidarity and friendship with Indigenous peoples on Turtle Island and around the Globe.

Global Partnerships Program

WOMEN OF COURAGE: WOMEN, PEACE AND SECURITY PROGRAM

The Women of Courage: Women, Peace and Security (WPS) program concluded on March 31 after six transformative years. Funded by the Government of Canada, member churches and individual donors, the program engaged over 32,000 participants—most of them women—and delivered lasting, measurable impact.

Throughout this time, WPS partners stood at the frontlines of intersecting crises: armed conflict, gender-based violence, climate change and deepening economic and food insecurity. Amid these challenges, they empowered women to lead change and build resilient, rights-affirming communities.

Grounded in a bold theory of change—that when women heal, reclaim their rights and restore their self-worth, they become powerful peacebuilders—the program has proven its effectiveness. KAIROS and our partners affirm with conviction: this approach works. With modest resources and in high-risk contexts, the program generated profound and enduring transformation.

KAIROS SOLIDARITY PARTNERS

KAIROS supported the vital work and advocacy of [14 solidarity partners](#) in Latin America, Africa, the Middle East and the Philippines' through grants totaling \$140,000. Our partnerships are more than funding, they are examples of mutual solidarity and shared commitment to feminism, human rights, ecological justice, decolonization and peace. They ground and inform our global advocacy work. They inspire and sustain hope.

“Hope isn’t guesswork or speculation; hope is an active, nonviolent struggle for justice and peace. Hope is shared among friends and allies.... What we in the Holy Land need most is hope—real, actionable hope, made visible, even tangible in partnership and solidarity. This is no time, then, for mere speculation. It’s a crisis of conscience, a moment of decision, a time to be counted. Hope insists, then, on discipline and action, even costly discipleship. And this kind of hope does not, will not disappoint us.”

GAZA CEASEFIRE PILGRIMAGE: CANADIAN CHURCHES FOR JUST PEACE

In April and May, individuals from 150 congregations across Canada joined **the Gaza Ceasefire Pilgrimage: Canadian Churches for Just Peace**, a bold public witness organized by KAIROS and its member churches. Inspired by the global pilgrimage leading up to Lent, participants walked or rolled the equivalent of Gaza's length, about 47 kilometres—collectively covering 10,000 km. The pilgrimage demanded a just peace in Palestine and Israel, calling for an immediate and lasting ceasefire, unrestricted humanitarian access, the release of all captives, an end to arms transfers to Israel and an end to the occupation. It culminated in Ottawa on May 22–23 with a powerful vigil

on Parliament Hill, a national press conference and direct meetings with Members of Parliament to press for decisive Canadian action.

In response to the ongoing crisis in Israel and Palestine, we have consistently condemned violence against civilians and amplified the calls of member churches, agencies and local and global partners for a just peace grounded in non-violence and respect for human rights. Responding to the escalating violence, human suffering and heightened urgency for just peace in Palestine and Israel, on October 7, KAIROS launched the new [Just Peace in the Middle East Ecumenical Hub](#). Echoing our partner Wi'am, we emphasized the yearning for a shared future, free from fear and oppression, and urged Canadians and the government to take decisive action to promote peace, justice, human rights and dignity.

ECUADOR DELEGATION SAYS NO TO FREE TRADE AGREEMENT

In the fall, four courageous women, leaders and human rights defenders from Ecuador, two of whom are Indigenous, visited Canada as part of the **“This is why we say No!”** delegation. Their mission: to sound the alarm about the devastating impacts that a proposed Free Trade Agreement (FTA) between Canada and Ecuador could have on their communities, lands and rights. Backed by KAIROS, Amnesty International, Mining Watch Canada and other civil society allies, the delegates brought their message directly to people and Parliamentarians in Toronto, Ottawa and Montreal. They emphasized the lack of transparency and consultation in the FTA negotiations—particularly with Indigenous and rural communities—and warned that the proposed investor-state dispute settlement provision would prioritize

corporate profits over people’s rights and environmental protection.

KAIROS opposes any free trade agreement that violates the Free, Prior and Informed Consent (FPIC) of Indigenous peoples. Such

agreements disregard the *United Nations Declaration on the Rights of Indigenous Peoples* (UNDRIP), which Canada has adopted into law. The proposed Canada-Ecuador free trade agreement has NOT consulted with Indigenous peoples in Ecuador.

Advocacy

KAIROS’ CALLS TO ACTION 2024

In 2024, we sharpened our advocacy with targeted Calls to Action across all program areas.

INVEST IN GLOBAL LEADERSHIP

frontline leaders in building peace and responding to the climate crisis. Drawing on the success of the Women of Courage: Women, Peace and Security program, KAIROS called for bold, sustained support in the face of rising global threats.

FEDERAL BUDGET 2024: A MIXED OUTCOME

KAIROS responded to the April 16 [federal budget with a critical analysis](#). While some investments aligned

with our priorities, significant gaps remain in funding for global justice, peacebuilding and climate action.

SOLIDARITY WITH HUMAN RIGHTS DEFENDERS IN THE PHILIPPINES

In December, The Hill Times published an op-ed, [Canada must champion peace and human rights in the Philippines](#), co-authored by Rachel Warden, Partnerships Manager at

KAIROS, and Jess Agustin, Campaign Committee Lead of the International Coalition for Human Rights in the Philippines–Canada.

UN FORUM ON SUSTAINABLE DEVELOPMENT GOALS

In July, Rachel Warden, was a Canadian delegate to **the UN High-Level Political Forum on the Sustainable Development Goals (SDG)** in New York. [Rachel's blog highlights](#) urgent, bold action on the SDGs. Amid a challenging Forum, powerful voices from civil society, governments and UN leaders demanded change.

16 DAYS OF ACTIVISM AGAINST GENDER-BASED VIOLENCE

During the global 16 Days of Activism Against Gender-Based Violence (November 25–December 10), KAIROS amplified the courage and relentless efforts of our global partners, Indigenous communities, migrant networks and allies—leaders that confront gender-based violence every day—demanding justice, driving change and transforming lives with unwavering strength and determination.

“DECOLONIZING OURSELVES: WE ALL DRINK FROM THE SAME RIVER”

In September, KAIROS Prairies North Decolonization Group hosted **Decolonizing Ourselves: We All Drink from the Same River** at Echo Valley Provincial Park, Treaty 4 Territory. Held during the 150th anniversary commemoration of Treaty 4, participants reflected, learned, and connected through ceremony and art. This gathering - the third in-person, on-the-land event hosted by this group - was made possible by generous financial support from The United Church of Canada and through the dedication and hard work of partner organizations.

INSPIRING JUSTICE AND SOLIDARITY ACROSS THE COUNTRY

In the fall of 2024, KAIROS regional networks convened powerful [gatherings](#) that deepened commitments to justice and care for the Earth.

In BC-Yukon, **OUT of the Ashes | New/Ancient Stories Still Rise UP** (October) brought people together for a weekend to explore storytelling as a response to climate crisis and societal collapse.

Northwestern Ontario and Manitoba hosted **Justice for All – Action for Migrant and Indigenous Rights** (October) in Winnipeg, featuring speakers on the future of KAIROS and urgent actions for migrant justice.

Prairies North, **Grounding the Future** (October) explored the spiritual dimensions of climate change, encouraging reflection on values that support both personal and collective transformation.

The Great Lakes–St. Lawrence region held **KAIROS Momentum** (November), showcasing new initiatives across KAIROS’ four pillars—Migrant, Indigenous, Ecological and Gender Justice—offering inspiration for ongoing advocacy and action.

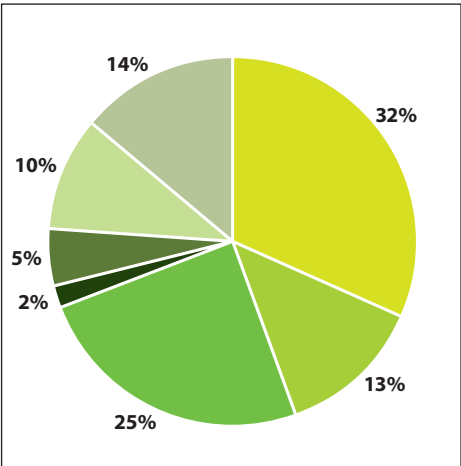
Financial Overview

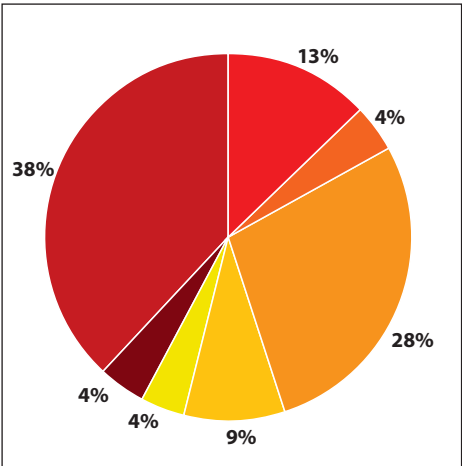

2024 REVENUE



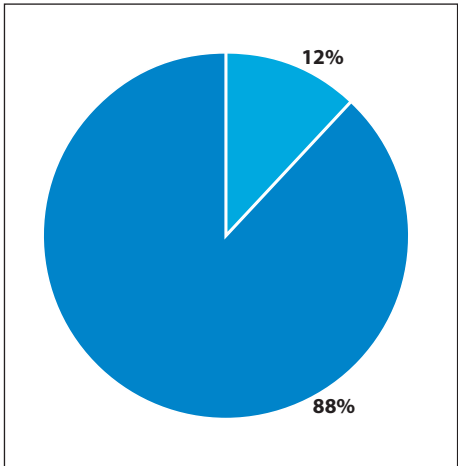

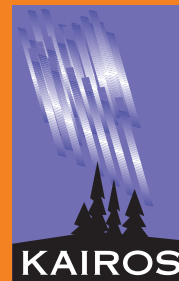
